IPM statement

It is the goal of Pajaro Valley Unified School District to implement IPM by focusing on long-term prevention or suppression of pests through accurate pest identification, by frequent monitoring for pest presence, by applying appropriate action levels, and by making the habitat less conducive to pests using sanitation and mechanical and physical controls. Pesticides that are effective will be used in a manner that minimizes risks to people, property, and the environment, and only after other options have been shown ineffective.

Our pest management objectives are to: *(Example: Focus on long-term pest prevention)*

1. Protect the health and safety of students, staff and faculty;
2. Protect the integrity of campus buildings and grounds;
3. Maintain a productive learning environment; and
4. Protect local ecosystem health

(Education Code Section 17610.5)
